# Frogs of the Loddon River



#### Common Spadefoot Toad NT (Neobatrachus sudelli)

- I call out "Craa-aw-aw-aw-aw-aw-awk", while floating in open water.
- I look like I wear baggy pants because the skin around the back of my legs is very loose.
- It can be hard to find me because I burrow into soil and I only come out after it rains.
- I eat insects, water bugs and dead tadpoles.
- Breeding: March May / August October



### Peron's Tree Frog (Litoria peroni)

• I'm also known as a Laughing Tree Frog because of my laughing call "Cra-ah-ah-ah-ah-ah-ah-ah-hk".

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- My cross shaped pupil makes me look different to all other Victorian frogs.
- I can be found in woodlands and large old River Red Gums.
- I eat the bugs that live in trees.



#### Breeding: September - December



# Girowling Girass Frog (Litoria raniformis)

- My call is a loud "Crok-crok-crok-crok-crawark".
- I am one of the largest frogs in Australia.
- I can be found in amongst grasses and reeds.
- I eat beetles, termites, cockroaches, moths, butterflies and grubs.

**Breeding: August - April** 



## Pobblebonk

(Limnodynastes dumerili)

- I call loudly, "Bonk...bonk...bonk", while floating in open water.
- I can be found in a large group after it rains; we're called an army.
- I shelter in small burrows on the banks of rivers and wetlands.
- I eat all sorts of water bugs and grubs. Breeding: August - April

- My call sounds like "Kuk, kuk, kuk, kuk".
- I am spotty with green or brown blotches and I have a white belly.
- I can be found nesting in plants along the water's edge.
- I eat bugs and grubs around swamps and wetlands.
- **Breeding: August May**



# Bibron's Toadlet

(Pseudophryne bibroni)

- I have a short sharp call "Cre-ek....cre-ek".
- I tend to walk rather than hop and I hide in damp leaves.
- I can be found in dry forests under logs.
- At night I eat ants, beetles and mites.
- **Breeding: March June**
